

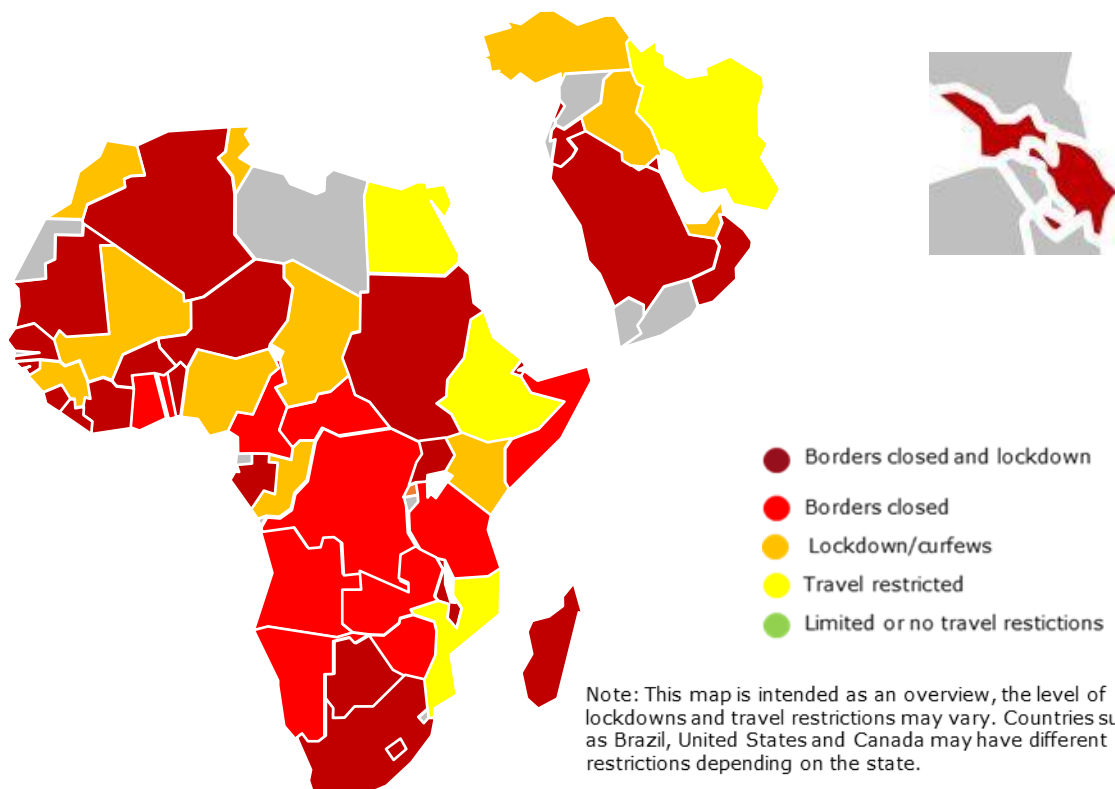
Covid-19 Middle East and Africa Travel and Containment Information Sheet

01.09.2020

Disclaimer: Falck Global Assistance adheres to the advice of local health authorities and the World Health Organization. Events regarding COVID-19 are subject to rapid change. Travellers are advised to follow the advice of their local health authorities.

About: The following is a brief overview of travel restrictions and containment measures for countries in the Middle East and North Africa. This is a living document that is updated twice weekly. Data collection is performed manually, and sources include national foreign ministries, embassies and consular missions abroad, and select newspapers of record. Keep in mind, information on this sheet is subject to rapid change. ***This should be referenced as a starting point only. Travellers and their stakeholders are strongly encouraged to perform regular due diligence on travel destinations and transit routes before embarking on international travel as containment measures and travel restrictions change by the hour.***

Overview: In many countries travel restrictions have been eased and we see an increase of countries demanding negative Covid-19 tests to enter.
